





Moretown Town Clerk's home flooded


Town clerk Susan Goodyear had to flee her Route 100B house with her family in such a hurry that she couldn't move the cars to higher ground. She watched the water from the bridge past Maynards.

While reporting on the general conditions throughout her town, Goodyear's own home received a full measure of damage. "Everything is wet," she said. Parts of her home had six to twelve inches of water and left silt throughout her house. Couches, chairs and carpets are wet and covered with silt. Insulation has been exposed

and a portion of the foundation of the building now needs work, she reported.

In addition, her car can not be moved. She stated that she has done more mopping in the last four days than in a lifetime. She said the water level reached its highest point since 'we have lived here (1951)." In the great flood of 1927, she was told, the water went to the first step of the house.

"We hope that by the end of the Fourth of July weekend we can call it a home. Right now it is livable, but the odors are terrible," she advised.
